
moving the garden in order to make room for a building project. I haven't decided for sure, but I might move the garden just in case.

President's Service Awards

The President's Volunteer Service Award (PVSA) program was established to honor volunteers who give hundreds of hours per year helping others. These volunteers can be individuals, families and organizations located throughout the United States. The PVSA is an initiative of the Corporation of National and Community Service (a federal agency) and is administered by the Points of Light (established by President George HW Bush in 1990). The President's Volunteer Service Award recognizes US citizens who have achieved the required number of hours of service. Hours are measured over a 12 month period and awards are designed based on accumulative hours. Our period is from November 1 thru October 31 of each year. Recipients receive a letter of congratulations signed by our current President of the United States, a certificate and a service pin.






Demonstration Garden

Kerr County Pecan Show

Each year pecan growers from the Hill Country area collect and enter their pecan entries to compete for awards, recognition and advancement to the South Texas Regional Show.

What makes a good sample?

Good pecan entries are uniform in color, shape and size; free of disease and insect markings with very little discoloration or white at the end of the pecans. Pecans should be free of splits or cracking to insure a good sample. Each entry will be selected based on a random sampling of 10 nuts selected from the entry. The 10 nuts are then weighed in shell, shelled and a kernel weight is then taken. Based on the size of the nuts, percent edible kernel, color and appearance the nuts are placed.

2 hours volunteer time was allowed.


