We turn another page on the 2020 calendar, and it's March, the eve of a gardener's favorite season! Not much for a gardener to do in January and February other than peruse seed catalogues looking for interesting new seeds to try, all the while contemplating old favorites. There is only so much dreaming and planning a gardener can do as he longs to do some spring clean-up and get his hands in the soil. Spring is near!

Our family lived very near Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania, home of the famous weather predicting groundhog, Punxsutawney Phil. All the hoopla of Groundhog Day was fun to watch, but we knew that no matter what Phil predicted, Spring was a long way off. We lived in the mountains where the last frost date in the spring is May 15<sup>th</sup>. An anxious, risk-taking gardener might try his luck and plant near the 1<sup>st</sup> of May, but one never knew if that effort would be in vain. The calendar says the first day of spring is March 19, but that certainly wasn't the experience of our time in the mountains of western Pennsylvania.

A lot has happened, since the last months Newsletter. 


**Germination Test** 

Last month I was demonstrating how I go about conducting germination tests on tomato seeds. At the time, the seeds had not had enough time in the moist paper towels to germinate yet. As you can see, most all the seeds have germinated. I am pleased with these results. If you are careful, you could transplant these seeds into soil and grow them out. It's still a bit early for tomatoes, remember we still have 6 more weeks of winter, I will wait a few weeks to start some new seeds.

I have already planted some Swiss chard and one rescued cabbage from the "Plantastic Program". Nobody wanted it so I showed mercy and gave it a home. Both cabbage and Swiss chard should be fine

planted now, both will tolerate the cool weather. At the "Plantastic Program" I learned of a new twist for growing garlic that I am trying this year. This should be interesting.




