




WHAT IS AN ANNULAR SOLAR ECLIPSE?



A solar eclipse happens when the moon journeys between Earth and the sun, blocking the view along a small path of Earth of some or all of the sun's face as it passes. The one that occurred on Saturday is a type called an "annular solar eclipse." This occurs when the moon passes between Earth and the sun at a time when the moon is at or close to its farthest point from our planet. It does not completely obscure the face of the sun, unlike in a total solar eclipse.



"Ring of Fire" was a spectacular show for millions of people across the Americas as the moon moved into place and blocked out all but a brilliant circle of the sun's outer edge.

Among the eerie phenomena that can accompany an eclipse of the sun, shadow bands are perhaps the most unusual. These mysterious gray ripples are sometimes seen flitting over the ground within several minutes of totality (the period when the sun's disk is fully concealed by the moon).

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Members Spice It Up at the Garden Club

First we made the salsa so the flavors would blend. Ms. Connie told us the planting instructions and care of the veggies needed for a simple salsa. Then we ATE it! Ole! Connie's Salsa Recipe

2 ripe tomatoes, peeled or not (optional), seeded and chopped
1-2 jalapeno peppers, depending on hotness of pepper and your taste
1 clove garlic, minced
1 modium opion, chapped

1 medium onion, chopped

Juice of 1/2 lime

1 to 2T. chopped cilantro

Salt to taste (1/2 teaspoon suggested)

If using a blender or food processor, process garlic, onion and peppers quickly before adding tomatoes and cilantro, or they will become too liquified. Mix all ingredients; allow flavors to blend for 15 to 30 minute before serving. Use as a dip with tortilla chips or as an accompaniment to meat or bean dishes at a meal. Makes about 1-1/2 cups. Note: peppers may be lightly blistered under broiler, if desired.
